THE TRUTH! **Thanks to you**, after two shaky yearsone virtual and the other shortened by two weeks-Camp iRock Year 8 was back to normal with swimming, field trips, Reading Buddies, YMCA fun, and of course, intensive literacy instruction- all wrapped up in a Camp iRock bow of enrichment and learning!

Preschool Pages, Women United's premier signature early literacy program, is also in full swing this year with eleven Pickens County Elementary Schools participating. We are so excited about the growth of this program and the impact it will have on young learners.

Camp iRock and Preschool Pages are part of United Way of Pickens County's BOLD GOAL that 70% of all Pickens County's third graders will read at grade level by 2025. Why is this important? Because third grade is the final year children are learning to read. After third grade, children are reading to LEARN. If they are not proficient readers when they begin the fourth grade, as

much as half of the curriculum they will be taught will be incomprehensible.

United Way donors, volunteers and partners like YOU have a "Go Big or Go Home" attitude. You accepted the challenge and doubled the number of first and second graders PLUS added a K4 pilot to the fully expanded K5 -3rd grade Camp iRock classrooms. This was so important because they lost most or all of their "reading years" due to the pandemic.

The Camp iRock partners- the School District of Pickens County, the YMCA of Easley, Pickens and Powdersville and the Call Me MiSTER interns- built the bigger program... but not without challenges. Hiring enough counselors and MiSTER interns was a real issue. Camp iRock is nothing without them.

The price tag for Camp iRock was huge, but not to worry because when the going gets tough, **you come through**. You made sure that 434 SUPER READERS had the summer of their lives. **You Rock!**

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FROM SHY TO CONFIDENT- YOU MADE ALL THE DIFFERENCE

Eric was shy, sometimes had trouble focusing, and wasn't a confident reader.

Even though his parents spent a lot of time reading with Eric at home, his reading scores were lower than they needed to be.

Eric's father, John Eby, is now at Clemson
University, but previously worked for the School
District of Pickens County. Through his work with
the School District, he became very
knowledgeable about every aspect of Camp iRock.
As the end of the school year approached, Eric's
parents secretly hoped Eric would be invited to
Camp iRock.

"Thrilled" doesn't begin to describe how John felt when Eric was invited to attend Camp iRock, but he still wasn't sure how Eric would respond. "I knew that the camp was a fantastic program overall, but you just never know how your child's unique experience is going to play out," he said. 
