We were a little worried about our ability to fund 1st and 2nd grades, not to mention the space requirements for so many children. **Then you showed up. You gave. You believed. You made it happen.** Because of you, we were able to meet the state requirements AND increase the number of 1st and 2nd graders too!

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Once again, we were fortunate to have an amazing Daniel High School intern, Sabrina Lin, who volunteered at all three Camp iRock sites this summer. The children were so open with Sabrina about how they were feeling, and she was able to share many stories from her internship with us. Here is what Sabrina had to say about her summer at Camp iRock:

"This was my first summer with Camp iRock, and it was one of the most eye-opening and meaningful experiences I've ever had. I visited each grade level at all three Camp sites and saw real growth—not just in reading skills, but in confidence. Some students came in nervous or unsure, but the dedication from teachers, MiSTERs, YMCA counselors, and Reading Buddies helped every child feel supported.

One student even told me, 'I really enjoy reading now because it's easier to read the words because of Camp.'

What stood out the most was the strong sense of community - everyone worked together to help these kids succeed. You could feel the difference Camp iRock made in how the students viewed reading, school, and themselves. They didn't just become better readers - they started to love learning. The energy and excitement at Camp could've powered a whole city!"

Camp iRock is for Everyone

For "Isaiah", the first day of Camp iRock was his favorite, not just because it was the start of something new, but because it was when he started making friends. Right away, he felt like he belonged. Camp quickly became a place where he could learn new things, like the sounds of letters and how to put them together to make words. It also became a place where he felt supported. For him, Camp iRock wasn't just about learning, it was about being a part of a community where everyone helped each other along the way.

From Nervous Reader to Top Performer

Hangman was one of "Zachary's" favorite games at Camp iRock. One time, the word was supercalifragilistic expialidocious (yes, that one!), and he was completely blown away when one of his friends guessed it right on the first try. It's moments like that, laughing, learning, and playing with friends, that made Camp iRock so special for him. But more than just fun, he also experienced real growth. He said he feels like he can concentrate better now when he reads, and reading out loud to the rest of the class doesn't make him nervous anymore. In fact, he feels like a more confident reader all around, and it shows! He passed his goal on his i-Ready reading assessment test by a LARGE margin!

Confidence Built Brick by Brick

On her very first day of Camp iRock, "Olivia" was nervous. Everything felt new, and she wasn't sure what to expect. But that didn't last long. A group of campers quickly welcomed her in, and just like that, she had new friends! She said one of her favorite things about Camp "is how kind and friendly everyone is." She also had a blast playing games, especially Poison Dart Frog. What really stood out to her, though, was learning how to read. She loved working through passages with her YMCA Counselor, Ms. Emily, who helped her build confidence and skills every day. By the end of Camp, she'd experience dramatic growth. At the beginning, she was only reading simple picture books. But now? She proudly says she can read chapter books too!



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CELEBRATING THE 2024-2025 EDUCATION IMPACT GRANTS- POWERED BY YOU!

United Way of Pickens County's Education Impact Grants are awarded annually through the hard work of the volunteer Education Impact Council. These Impact Grants support local programs that improve third-grade reading outcomes and focus on early literacy initiatives that are rooted in evidence-based practices. A key priority is engaging parents and families, especially in vulnerable communities, to help build strong home-school connections that support children's reading success. The 2024–2025 programs were all highly successful and made major impacts in their areas.

East End Elementary: Brilliant Bulldog Den

"The look on a child's face when they 'buy' a book from the vending machine with a reading token is pure joy, and it's turning our kids into readers."

East End's Brilliant Bulldog Den gave out more than **1,500 books** and held exciting events that got families involved and engaged. Students took part in reading challenges, and families came to workshops to learn how to help foster learning at home. A vending machine that gave out books for good behavior helped make reading fun for everyone. **36% of targeted students achieved a full year of reading growth, and 24 students moved from below to on-grade-level proficiency.**

Pickens County First Steps: Reach Out and Read & Lantern

"It's not just a book, it's a moment between parent and child. And now, those moments are happening more often in Liberty homes."

This program empowered families in the Liberty area by increasing access to high-quality children's books and boosting parent-child reading time. Through pediatrician-distributed books and supportive messages via Lantern-a free texting service for parents and caregivers of young children prenatal to 8 years old-the initiative reached 840 children, far exceeding the original goal of 500. In addition, 100% of parents surveyed reported increased access to quality books and more lap reading time.





Six Mile Elementary: Flat Stanley and His Worldwide Adventures

"Flat Stanley didn't just travel the world, he helped our students discover that reading can take you anywhere."

Six Mile Elementary brought reading to life through Flat Stanley's global adventures. The program creatively connected literacy to geography and culture while encouraging reading at home and school. With a focus on fun and curiosity, students made impressive gains in both attitude and achievement. 89% of students scored "approaching," "met," or "exceeds" on the SC Ready reading test, and 95% said they enjoy reading more now.

McKissick Academy of Science and Technology: Building Reading Literacy through STEM

"Our goal was to reach students reading below grade level, and instead, we reached every single one, with 100% participation in each grade. That speaks volumes about how much our children want to learn when we meet them where they are."

McKissick Academy's innovative literacy program used hands-on STEM activities to engage 297 K-3 students, exceeding its goal by over 100 children. The school utilized creative strategies like a retired reading tutor and STEM-based financial literacy integration to support struggling readers and build confidence both academically and emotionally. Since implementing this program, 75% of third grade students scored at or above the national benchmark in the "Ready by Spring" category of the i-Ready reading assessment.
